REPORTS FROM PEER SUPPORT GROUPS



The Notts Network Peer Support Group for Secretaries had its first zoom meeting on the 8 December, and it proved to be a supportive and informative forum for the sharing of ideas and knowledge. The secretaries who took part came from different levels of experience, some being very new to their roles, whereas others had years of experience, sometimes following being the chair of their u3a.

Everyone had had the same challenges to meet during this Covid affected year, and so all were keen to share their approaches and ideas for continuing contact and activity for members. We think it will continue to be a useful tool in helping the u3a organisation and bringing in new ideas and methods. It can sometimes feel a bit daunting and lonely if you don't quite know what you are doing! Also, even where there is loads of past experience, it is always good to try new things or to consider new approaches and to not get 'stuck in the mud'.

We decided a good first step was to set up a WhatsApp group for easy and quick contact and questions. This will be open to all the secretaries in the Notts Network. We will also meet via zoom monthly, rotating the lead person so it is an equitable place for conversation.

We look forward to this being a supportive, informative and jolly group.

A Peer Support Group for Interest Groups Co-ordinators was held on 26 November and points discussed included:

Difficulty in linking Beacon details to corresponding webpage. Worth investigating, but SiteBuilder is bad for this. WhatsApp used for meetings

Need to keep a focus for meetings on Zoom, based on their group activity.

Several u3as are holding monthly meetings successfully, and sometimes needing the +500 option on Zoom Pro. The Zoom Pro licence is being moved between groups, which works so long as someone keeps track of the timetable. If the group leader doesn't do Zoom, then holding a meeting on Zoom with the group might identify someone who does.

There are alternatives to remote meetings, eg phone and email discussions within a defined time slot.

Virtual Cafe at a defined time for the whole membership to drop in to.

Zoom guidance available on the Notts Network website. Facebook guidance available on the u3a National website.

A second meting will be set up, probably in the New Year.

Starved of much activity since March more than 150 members of Southwell u3a joined their Christmas Party by Zoom on 10 December, the first time our u3a has linked up with so many members.



A Risk Assessment must be submitted before an open sleigh is considered safe for members of the public to engage in recreational trips including the strict application of seat belts and wearing of appropriate protective headgear. The Risk Assessment should also consider whether the use of only one horse is appropriate, particularly if some passengers may be of larger proportions. Permission from landowners must also be gained before entering any fields and extreme care should be observed to ensure that no livestock may be discomfited or otherwise affected and that all gates are closed so that livestock cannot escape.

To avoid offending those not participating in the venture, it is required that only 'moderate' laughter, light jingling of bells and quiet singing takes place and not at a noise level that may cause offence to others.
