MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF NOTTS NETWORK

October 20th saw the annual Notts Network AGM and meeting. We made short work of the AGM with the most significant points being the agreement to place the Network subscription charge at £15 for the period August 2021 to July 2022 and the agreement for the Network Officers to remain in place for another year. We are very grateful to them for all they do for

The Network meeting included a very fruitful discussion on the development of the Network and what members would like to see included in its programme. Here are the suggestions:

- More Peer support groups. It was suggested that these could be open as often topics for discussion would be useful
 to committee members holding a variety of roles. E.g., Constitutions and Charity Commission procedures.
- Another day conference to be organised by the Network.
- Development of Study days and Shared learning projects.
- A Diversity and Inclusion presentation will be available to all u3as as a national workshop.
- Network speaker events taking advantage of larger numbers & therefore could pay more.

One idea put forward by members of the Publicity Peer Support Group is a future Network publicity event to be held during the week of u3a Day September 18 – 26 2022.

An initial idea, which is subject to change, is to base it on the 'Olympic Beacon'. A u3a would dress up advertising a particular interest group and walk/move to the next nearest u3a who would take over advertising a different group etc. It would culminate in a grand event in the centre of Nottingham. Hopefully there would be media interest.

The Publicity PSG members are to take this idea further but would be grateful if Network u3as could consider the bare bones of the idea and put members forward to the PSG to help with the planning.

Guiding Principles of the u3a Movement

These Principles have been the basis of the u3a values since the launch of the Movement in 1982 by our founding fathers, Peter Lazlett, Eric Midwinter and Michael Young.

The u3a Movement is non-religious and non-political and has three main principles.

The Third Age Principle

- ♦ Membership of a u3a is open to all in their third age, which is defined not by a particular age but by a period in life in which full-time employment has ceased.
- ♦ Members promote the values of lifelong learning and the positive attributes of belonging to a u3a.
- Members should do all they can to ensure that people wanting to join a u3a can do so.

The Self-help Learning Principle

- ♦ Members form interest groups covering as wide a range of topics and activities as they desire. By the members, for the members.
- No qualifications are sought or offered. Learning is for its own sake, with enjoyment being the prime motive, not qualifications or awards.
- There is no distinction between the learners and the teachers. They are all members.

The Mutual Aid Principle

- ♦ Each u3a is a mutual aid organisation, operationally independent but a member of the Third Age Trust, which requires adherence to the guiding principles of the u3a movement.
- No payments are made to members for services rendered to any u3a.
- ♦ Each u3a is self-funded by membership subscriptions and costs are kept as low as possible.
- Outside financial assistance should only be sought if it does not imperil the integrity of the u3a movement.



We have been reading in the press recently that the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) is about to start a public consultation on Government proposals to ban single use plastic cutlery and crockery in an effort to reduce litter. DEFRA say "items used for a few minutes can last for centuries in landfill or as litter in the countryside or ocean. Around the world, more than one million birds and over 100,000 sea mammals and turtles die every year from eating or getting tangled in plastic waste."

So, a couple of months ago, in anticipation of this expected ban and to demonstrate their concern for nature and the environment, the Ravenshead u3a committee introduced a new plan for the provision of hot drinks at monthly meetings. All members are asked to bring with them a re-usable mug or cup

which the refreshment volunteers fill with the selected drink. If any member forgets to bring a reusable cup there is still a small supply of polystyrene cups but the committee hopes these will only be needed in the short term until members get used to bringing their own. This scheme has got off to a very good start and already most members are remembering to bring a reusable cup from home.

Back in November 2020, Brenda Ainsley, of Cotgrave and District u3a, attended a meeting with fellow Climate Reality Leaders, as they set out to plan activities to take place during COP26 in Glasgow. The group was very keen to demonstrate all kinds of diversity and wanted to include the voices of all age groups. Brenda recognised that u3a could play an



important part in this. The Trust u3a group 'Countdown to COP' was founded and quickly grew to a membership of over 40. Along with several Scottish members, the group organised and ran a series of four workshops in Glasgow, to look at the topic of Intergenerational Climate Action* As guests of the Climate Reality Project and a consortium of partners, these workshops took place on an electric bus at the First Bus Depot in Glasgow. Approximately 30 u3a members took part.
