# THE LIFE OF u3as IN NOTTINGHAMSHIRE

## **KEYWORTH & DISTRICT u3a**

Keyworth & District u3a has been welcoming members for 13 years The launch meeting was held on the 27<sup>th</sup> January 2009 with the encouragement and support of members of West Bridgford u3a. After the launch we were also helped by Nottingham u3a and Mansfield u3a. The launch meeting was hugely successful, Keyworth Methodist Church was packed with over 200 attendees. A full committee was formed, and 14 interest group leaders put themselves forward. The inaugural meeting was held on 24<sup>th</sup> February. By coincidence 2009 was also the year in which the first meeting of the Nottinghamshire Network of u3as was held, and at that time there were around 13 u3as.

Keyworth Methodist Church had a traditional church interior with rows of pews. In January 2010 the church building closed for extensive refurbishment and the u3a Open Meetings were moved to the Village Hall. In September 2010 we were able to move back to the church for our meetings. The interior of the church had been transformed with flexible, comfortable seating, attractive décor and best of all an inbuilt audio-visual system with the ability to transmit services from the church to the hall at the back of the building. This meant that we had an overflow area when Open Meeting attendances were over the church seating capacity of 120. Membership has for some time stabilised at around 500 with precovid meeting attendances in the range 80 to 150.

We are fortunate to have the British Geological Survey (BGS) within Keyworth. There are several retired BGS employee members who have given talks or who have contacts willing to give talks on topics such as Earthquakes (2013), Volcanoes (2014), Fracking (2015). The talk on Fracking attracted some unwelcome hecklers from outside the area and we subsequently stopped using the term Open Meeting in favour of Monthly Meeting.

During the first year a 'New Horizons' committee was formed taking upon itself the organisation of trips and events open to all members. This continued with a full programme right up to the start of the pandemic. It all began with a garden party at the home of the then team leader. From castles, museums, stately homes, libraries, and theatres to vintage cars and motorcycles, the space centre, wonderful exhibitions, river cruises and Greyhound racing. Travel was always a significant factor using local buses, car share, community buses and luxury coaches. Many celebratory events have been organised over the years not least of which have been many Christmas parties attended on occasions by over 100 members.

We are fortunate to have had enthusiastic newsletter editors throughout our existence with 37 quarterly paper newsletters up to 2018 and 45 monthly electronic newsletters thereafter. Committee Meetings and Monthly Meetings have continued throughout the pandemic using Zoom and both are now being held in-person again. An in-person AGM was held in September 2021 with 142 members attending. As we emerge from lockdown there are a few groups which have opted not to continue but currently there are an encouraging 36 groups operating.

## Publicity in Unexpected Places



Here in Beeston we are very lucky to live in a thriving and diverse community. There are new shops and restaurants opening, plenty of musical and artistic events, a new cinema and even, this year – our own Light Night! The Beeston u3a reflects this lively neighbourhood, with over 900 members and more than 80 active u3a groups.

We know that a lot of our new members find us through word of mouth, mainly via existing members - but we have set out to attract an even wider age range, and ensure recruitment for the future. That

is why we chose to approach The Garage Chilwell, who for the last decade have been hosting amazing events in the Barton Transport Limited bus garage, on Chilwell Road. The garage was built in 1913 and went on to be the home the largest independent bus operator in Western Europe for many years.

The Sunday morning food markets at the Garage have built a fantastic reputation over the last couple of years, with The Independent and The Telegraph both naming it one of the top Farmers' Markets in the UK. The Market organisers were very happy to support the u3a when we explained the community benefits. They gave us a small stand for no charge at their first 2022 market in early February.



We put our banners up and hoped to give out a few leaflets and answer a few queries – but we were overwhelmed by the response for the full four hours the market was open. Even before the doors had opened an artisan cider supplier on a nearby stand offered to come and organise a cider tasting event for our u3a! We spoke to



many existing members, making sure they knew about our Group Fair coming up in March. We prompted several people who had been meaning to get round to looking into joining into action. We had lots of enquiries on behalf of neighbours and family members. And we planted a few seeds in the fertile minds of people who are approaching retirement in the next few years.

Being associated with the Garage broadened our publicity appeal. We even tagged them (and hence their 8500+ audience) into our 'thank you' Facebook post.

As well as meeting up with some of our own friends and neighbours who were visiting the market, we left with some high quality hummus, olives, cakes, pastries and fudge from the irresistible stalls!
